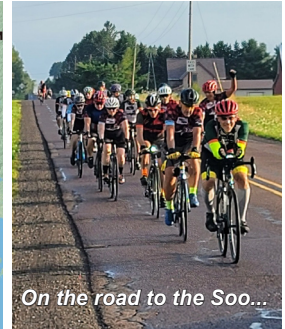
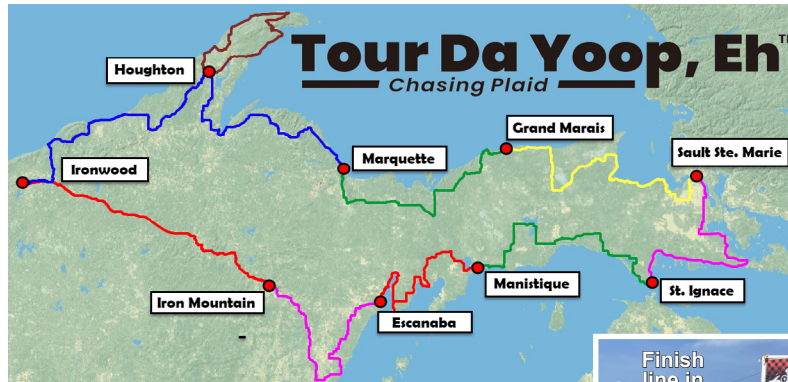

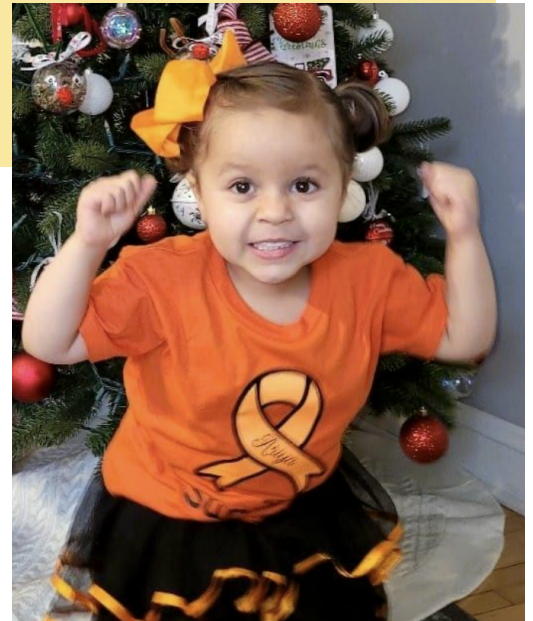

Parent Kaitlyn Guay shares her personal experience with her daughter's diagnosis, and how it has opened her eyes to the many needs to be addressed.

“Your child has cancer.” Four words that no parent ever wants to hear. Before hearing those words, all I knew about childhood cancer was summed up in the little bald heads of children on St. Jude commercials. I didn't know that childhood cancer is represented by a gold ribbon. I didn't know that September is a month dedicated to Childhood Cancer Awareness. Most importantly, I didn't know all the awful things that those little bald-headed children had to go through to fight for their lives. I didn't know. Childhood cancer deserves the resources and awareness that other well-known cancers receive because children are our future and children deserve to have a future.

Childhood cancer affects more children and adolescents than you would think, and more awareness is crucial in leading doctors to make earlier diagnoses.

My almost two-year-old daughter quit walking and it took almost three months to



that were developed decades ago. While the treatment protocols are mostly working to cure certain childhood cancers, treatments are generally long and have so many awful side effects. Several of the side effects that children experience can be lifelong or lead to other health problems throughout the rest of their lives.

More childhood cancer awareness could also help people be more understanding and empathetic to children and the families affected by it.

I have been told that we are lucky she has the “good cancer,” and it hurts my heart to hear that because no cancer is good cancer. Children fighting cancer often have severely compromised immune systems so they can't do some of the things that most children get to do. Some can't even go to school. If they have siblings, the siblings often miss out on things because

get a diagnosis. We went to doctor after doctor, got lab work done on multiple occasions, went to countless physical therapy appointments, and I was mostly made to feel like an overprotective mom because I knew my daughter was in pain, enough pain that she didn't even want to stand even though prior to when she quit walking she loved going for long walks. Early labs came back with mostly normal results, and I was reassured that she didn't have anything serious like “cancer,” so it was far from my mind. Had I known how quickly those labs could change because of cancer, I would have fought for all labs to be drawn sooner and more often. More importantly, had the doctor been more aware of how quickly those labs could change, they may have been more proactive in getting my daughter's lab work done more frequently instead of being convinced it couldn't be cancer and judging me as I was back in the office with her, crying and begging for answers. Sadly, my experience and feelings of being brushed off by doctors because of not knowing enough about the initial signs and symptoms of childhood cancer is too common with other parents of children fighting cancer because there is not enough awareness.

Another reason we need more resources and awareness for childhood cancer is to help advance research.

There are many kinds of childhood cancer, and sadly, too many have no cures. Most of the childhood cancers that do have cures are based off treatment protocols

O'Neal, MacDonell, Dievendorf, Neeley, Rheingans, Hood, Brenda Carter, Glanville and Farhat and referred to the Committee on Insurance and Financial Services.

they can't risk getting their sibling with cancer sick. Childhood cancer often causes financial stress on the families because treatment is expensive, some families travel for treatment, and because of their compromised immune system or the level of care needed, sometimes it is safer for one parent to stay home with the child.

My daughter was diagnosed with B-cell Acute Lymphoblastic Leukemia (ALL). There is a high survival rate for children with ALL, but the treatment is long and can cause not only horrible side effects as they are being administered, but also lifelong side effects or side effects that come along later in life, years after treatment has ended. Even though she

reached remission after induction, the first phase in her treatment protocol, she still must continue treatment, or she will most likely relapse. A relapse is often harder and harsher to treat. My daughter is doing well and is set to finish treatment with an end date of March of 2024, (which is 802 days from her diagnosis). but they won't consider her cured until five years after that. She will have to go for regular blood tests to make sure she hasn't relapsed and to check her liver and kidney functions. She will have to have heart tests periodically throughout the rest of her life because of the awful "red devil" chemo she received in the delayed intensification phase of treatment. The "red devil" is a chemo that is used to treat many kinds of cancer and is given the name because of the red color and extremely harsh side effects, including

heart problems that could arise at any stage of life after receiving it.

Childhood cancer deserves more resources and awareness.

Stores should be stocking the shelves with gold ribbon merchandise and displaying posters with statistics, sports should have "Gold-Out" games with half-time dedicated to sharing stories like ours, commercials should be talking about the statistics and signs to look out for, and there should be more funding to research childhood cancer to advance the treatments. There should just be more for these brave, young warriors. Childhood cancer shouldn't be something you learn about only when it affects you or someone you love directly. We need to fight for the kids that are fighting for their lives.

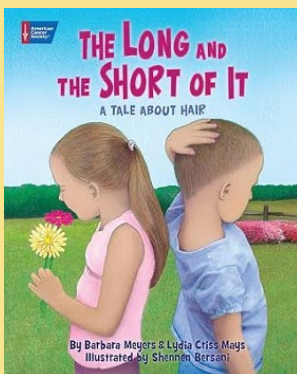
Book Corner

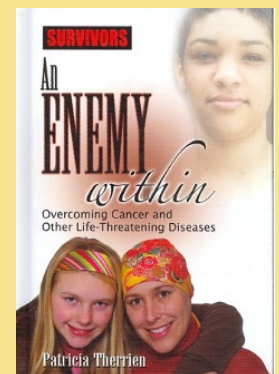
An Enemy Within: Overcoming cancer and other life-threatening diseases
