# An open letter to the man who saved our son's life

Dear Bone Marrow Donor,

Though it's been a while since our story first began - Our family has received the wonderful "gift" that you so unselfishly gave for our son.

This gift is like NOTHING we have EVER received in this lifetime... & NOTHING that we'll ever receive in the future.

We KNOW that it took a thoughtful, caring and incredibly loving person to consider giving a gift like this one, at ALL.



There are not proper words to thank

Our son Camden was only 6 TINY weeks old when his father & I learned that he had "zero chance of survival, WITHOUT a successful bone marrow transplant. -Our lives were completely flipped upsidedown. We scrambled for answers & a way to save him from a fate that NO infant/child should EVER have to face.

A couple short weeks later - We would

learn that Camden had a match on the "Be The Match" bone marrow registry! Shortly thereafter, we would start the process of preparing Camden for his BMT. 💙 🙏

We would learn that "our Saving Grace" was YOU! - An impossibly KIND young man from the United States. We were told VERY little about you, as far as details.... Mostly, just that "Camden's donor" was in excellent health & that he was roughly a "30 year old man from America."

Similar to the small amount of information WE were given on him.... the donor ALSO receives VERY "little information" on the patient they will hopefully be "saving."

This young man would learn he had matched with a (then) 2-month old, little boy from the US who was suffering from HLH. - He was told that "HLH is a viciouscondition, most-similar to leukemia." ...& that this sweet, little boy would NOT survive WITHOUT this bone marrow transplant. And that his HLH would inevitably "claim his life" without a successful outcome.

The medical professionals explained that the little boy's "condition" was rapidly declining, & his treatment would need to begin SOON. 🙏

With little to NO hesitation... our donor,

a BRAVE young-soul IMMEDIATELY jumped into action & began preparing himself to make the ULTIMATE sacrifice for our family! - Donating bone marrow to a little boy he KNEW he had NEVER met! ...& may NEVER actually "meet" in the

This young man gave my family the anonymous "Gift of Life."

We can NEVER properly thank you for this amazing gift that you have bestowed upon my family!!!! - We can only express our DEEPEST gratitude. and ALWAYS keep you and your family in our thoughts and prayers!

can be - Because YOU have modeled it



# Be the match... Please!

Nearly 10,000 children in the United States under the age of 15 will be diagnosed with cancer in 2024. Because of major treatment advances in recent decades, 85% of children with cancer now survive 5 years or more. The most common types of cancers among kids are leukemia, brain cancer, lymphoma, and neuroblastoma.

Children with blood cancers like leukemia and lymphoma, or other life-threatening diseases, may be treated and sometimes cured with a blood stem cell donation. To receive this, a genetic match must be found using lists from all possible donors. From these lists, a matching can be found and then the donor's healthy stem cells can be collected and used to replace a patient's sick cells—and their entire immune system.

Even with a registry of millions, many patients cannot find a match. More donors will increase the chances of finding these genetic matches.

The NMDP—the National Blood Marrow Donation Program—is a nonprofit that handles the matching process. First, eligibility is determined. Donors must be between 18 and 40 and complete a short health history.

Eligible donors will receive a swab kit in the mail, then can collect their own cheek swab and return the swab in a prepaid envelope.

Then the donor waits until a potential match is needed. When a match is found, the donor is notified and must promptly go to where the donation will be made.

What happens when someone donates? It depends—there are two types of donations. About 90% of donations are peripheral blood stem cell (PBSC) donations, which is like donating plasma. In the days leading up to one of these donations the donor will be given injections of filgrastim, a medication that increases the number of blood-forming cells in the bloodstream.

During donation, the donor's blood goes through a needle on one arm and is passed through a machine that separates out the blood-forming cells. The remaining blood is returned through the other arm. Donors are awake and able to play cards or read during the donation.

The other donation type is a marrow donation. Marrow donations make up about 10% of total donations. Marrow

donation is a surgical procedure where doctors use needles to withdraw liquid marrow (where the body's blood-forming cells are made) from the back of the donor's pelvic bone. Donors are given anesthesia and should not feel any pain while donating.

There is a recovery period for either type of donation. Donors can usually go back to work, school and most other activities within 1-7 days. Blood stem cells return to normal levels within a few weeks. It's important to note recovery times vary depending on the individual and the type of donation.

The median time to full recovery:

- 7 days for PBSC donation
- 20 days for marrow donation

What about the cost? The NMDP covers 100% of the cost, including the treatment as well as all personal and professional expenses, such as travel, lost wages, child or pet care.


#### Chemo to the Rescue: A Children's Book About Leukemia


